原子力災害後に「共に生きる」 “Living Together” After The Nuclear Accident

Structured Dialogue



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“What are the conditions and means favoring good living together in Fukushima affected areas in the future?”

Listening to Others: This dialogue provides an opportunity to listen to each others

Flexibility in Listening: Being flexible in listening to others is essential for living together without criticizing other people's views.

Importance of Memorials: Recognizing the importance of memorials for building the future

Continuing Communication: even when it is difficult, without giving up.

Understanding of authorities: Local and national government understanding the residents' situation is crucial.

Challenges of Building Connections:

Acknowledging the difficulties of making connections.

Mutual Assistance: Helping each other to live together (“We have been helped, we need to help others”)

Communicating the reality of the living conditions to the authorities (particularly as far as the situation of the evacuees is concerned)

Creating a Collaborative Environment: Creating an environment where people can work together.

Contemplating Human Nature: Reflecting on what human beings are through dialogues.

Establishing Connections: Emphasizing the importance of having a "connection." (Cf. UK experience)

Promoting Local Communities and Projects

Opening Meeting Spaces: Establishing places to meet, such as seminars, dialogue meetings...

Involving Young People: Highlighting the importance of involving young people

Connecting with Residents: The need to better connect with former residents and new residents to understand the situation.

Providing Resources for Local Projects: Providing resources for the further development of local projects.

Addressing Children's Health Concerns: The need to address the long-term health concerns of children.

Exploring Possibilities: Exploring the possibilities of connecting with artists, philosophers, and others (Art exhibitions : to attract more young people)

Learning Lessons from FNPPA Consequences: Acknowledging that there are still lessons to be learned regarding the consequences of the Fukushima Accident at the local, regional, national levels

Government Support: The national government needs to provide social communities with support from both the national and local government.

Research on Radioactive Cesium Behavior: Conducting further research on the behavior of radioactive cesium.

Basic Conditions for Coexistence: Exploring the basic conditions required for people to live together.

Reflecting on Nuclear Accident Consequences: The need for collective reflection to understand the consequences of nuclear accidents.

Understanding the Gap: Understanding the gap between what the national government says regarding residents returning and what people believe about whether they should return.

Courage for Community Changes: The courage required to bring about changes in the community.

Considering Minority Views: Taking into account minority views in the reconstruction process.

Challenges in Remote Areas: Recognizing that the will to consider living together tends to wane when living in remote areas far from the contaminated areas.

Support for Young Entrepreneurs: Providing support for young entrepreneurs.
